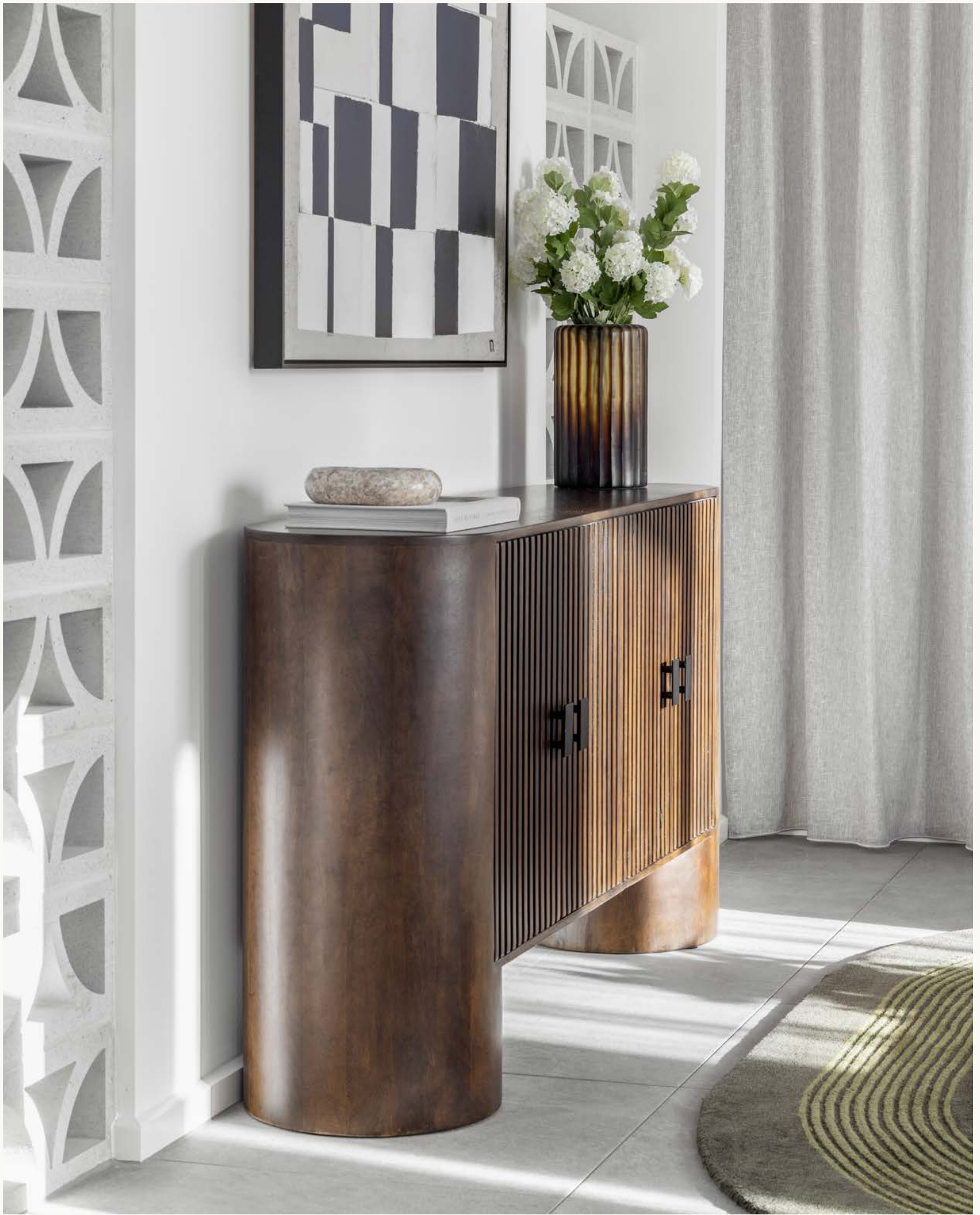

Modern interior design is clean, calming, and monochromatic. It eliminates unnecessary ornamentation, favouring minimalist furniture and integrated features like smart home technology. Layer a base palette of white, grey, black or beige and feature bold accent colours to create sophisticated and visually striking spaces.

Benchtops

Think about how you can create contrast and bring hints of organic texture to your surfaces with the marbled veins of a stone benchtop.

Cabinetry

Flat-panel cabinetry in a matte or satin finish, a concealed rangehood, and a limited use of handles combine for a Modern inspired kitchen.

Fixtures

Strong accents of matte black, brass or brushed nickel come into play, enhancing a modern monochromatic palette.

Lighting

Illuminate your Modern space with lighting that has an architectural, slimline feel. That could mean sleek track lighting, surface mounted downlights or sophisticated pendant lighting.

Splashbacks

From continuing your stone benchtop up to your splashback to chic finger tiles or a streamlined subway, there's a world of tiles to consider when keeping with the Modern theme.

Bath and shower

Modern bathroom design is all about approachable luxury. Extended showers, tiled seats and practical niches are all favourite features. Incorporating a focal point, such as a freestanding bath, helps to create a sophisticated but tranquil sanctuary.

Mirrors

To match the silhouettes found in your vanity, basins and even your shower and bath, an oversized rectangular mirror finishes your space beautifully and allows light to bounce around the space.

Tiles

Floor to ceiling tiles are a common feature of Modern design. Our tip? The larger the tiles, the fewer grout lines you have, which creates a greater sense of openness and space in your bathroom.

Vanity

Continue your flat panel cabinetry from your kitchen to your floating vanity and laundry benchtop for a sleek and streamlined look. Incorporate square above or below counter basins to mirror the edges of your vanity.

Flooring

Timber flooring using wide boards is preferred over patterned flooring in Modern design. Large format floor tiles make the space feel larger and simplified with fewer grout lines, while rectified and polished edges to tiles will give a more seamless and Modern look.

Stairs

Sleek glass balustrading and an open design are all common features of a Modern inspired staircase. Voids above the staircase and concealed joints are the finer details that elevate this look.

Textures and styling

While Modern design is characterised by surfaces that are hard and dark, the space is expertly softened and given a homely feel with cosy fabrics such as wool and boucle featured across furniture, rugs and throws.

External

Alfresco

Modern design heroes clean lines, and the alfresco space is no different. Blur the lines between the inside and outside with a simple use of streamline stacking doors.

Bricks

A Modern facade is all about the use of mixed materials. From cladding to render and of course, brick. Stick to monochromatic tones, with a clean and smooth finish.

Cladding

Exterior cladding is a great tool to highlight a Modern facade's geometric silhouette, while featuring wide panels delivers an urban and architectural edge.

Roof

You'll typically find flat or skillion style rooflines in Modern facade architecture, while clean lines, simplicity and functional materials take centre stage.

Benchtops

A large island becomes the focal point of any Hamptons kitchen, complete with a classic white marble or veined stone. Including boxed ends and profiles around the island further enhances the look.

Cabinetry

Classic shaker style and glass front cabinetry is a must for any Hamptons-inspired kitchen. Keep your cabinetry neutral or add hues of rich navy for a nod to traditional Hamptons design.

Fixtures

Beautiful brass, matte black, brushed nickel or polished chrome fittings and fixtures are the best place to start. When choosing hardware, classic knobs or cup handles enhance the profile of your cabinetry.

Lighting

Oversized pendants above the kitchen island made from glass, rattan or industrial-look metal speak to the Hamptons style and provide functional task lighting.

Splashback

Continue your marbled stone up the walls or incorporate subway tiles in a traditional brick or elegant herringbone pattern to create subtle interest. A window splashback is also a beautiful way to flood your Hamptons kitchen with natural light and brighten your space.

Bathroom & Laundry

Bath

Hamptons design typically features curved edges, and the bathtub is no different. For a classic touch, include a stunning, white freestanding bath and you'll have a beautiful oasis in no time.

Mirrors

Curves come into play here and arched, circular or oval mirrors should be top of your list. Ornate framed feature mirrors can be a showstopper in this space.

Tiles

Patterned, encaustic tiles are a hallmark of Hamptons design. Keep them as floor tiles or carry them up to your splashback for a beautiful feature. Alternatively, a herringbone pattern delivers a luxurious finish.

Vanity

Continue the theme of marbled stone and shaker style cabinetry from your kitchen, even choosing to incorporate navy or light blue hues for a pop of colour. Circular, above counter basins finish your Hamptons-inspired bathroom beautifully.

Flooring

Chevron or herringbone patterned timber flooring is a popular choice for main flooring. To simplify the look, wide timber boards are becoming increasingly popular. Soften the boards with cream and light toned wool pile carpet. Accent your space with the natural woven fibres of jute or sisal for your rugs.

Joinery

Built-in joinery gives your Hamptons living space plenty of character. Think about including built-in buffets and side tables, daybeds and bookcases in your chosen shade of white for a homely heart of your home.

Lighting

Ornamental lighting, detailed pendants and wall sconces are a popular design choice in Hamptons. Style your space further with accent lighting such as floor and table lamps.

External

Accents and trimming

A Hamptons facade isn't complete without the use of timber detailing and trims with a subtle contrast. Think about how your window panes, porch pillars, fascias and gutters can create interest to your weatherboard exterior and accentuate your gable roofline.

Cladding

Nothing is more quintessentially Hamptons than a weatherboard exterior painted in a coastal-inspired colour scheme, whether that be all white, soft greys or muted pastels. Stackstone cladding on base pillars also enhances the facade, adding texture and a sense of depth.

Roof

Hamptons-inspired facades are characterised by a gable roofline which expertly enhances the nautical feel. Complete the look with a steel or tiled roof in a contrasting colour to your weatherboard cladding.

Benchtops

In keeping with the Contemporary aesthetic, stone benchtops of a neutral colour and with subtle veining will be your go-to.

Fixtures

Brass, chrome or brushed nickel tapware all work well with the pared back, organic palette of Contemporary.

Lighting

Lighting in Contemporary kitchens blends form and function, often featuring sleek pendant lights, recessed LED fixtures, and under-cabinet illumination to create a bright, inviting, and highly functional space.

Splashbacks

For your splashback, take a finger or vertical subway tile in your neutral colour scheme for a sophisticated finish that accentuates the height of your space.

Lighting

A Contemporary bathroom should feel spa-like, and strip lighting behind your mirror is a great way to enhance the glow of your room.

Mirrors

Contemporary design showcases gentle and organic curves, and an oversized circular mirror enhances this sense of movement.

Tiles

Your neutral palette will be key to keeping your Contemporary theme. A weathered texture or subtle veining to your floor and wall tiles accentuates the organic feel, while a feature wall in a subtle contrast helps to instill a sense of openness.

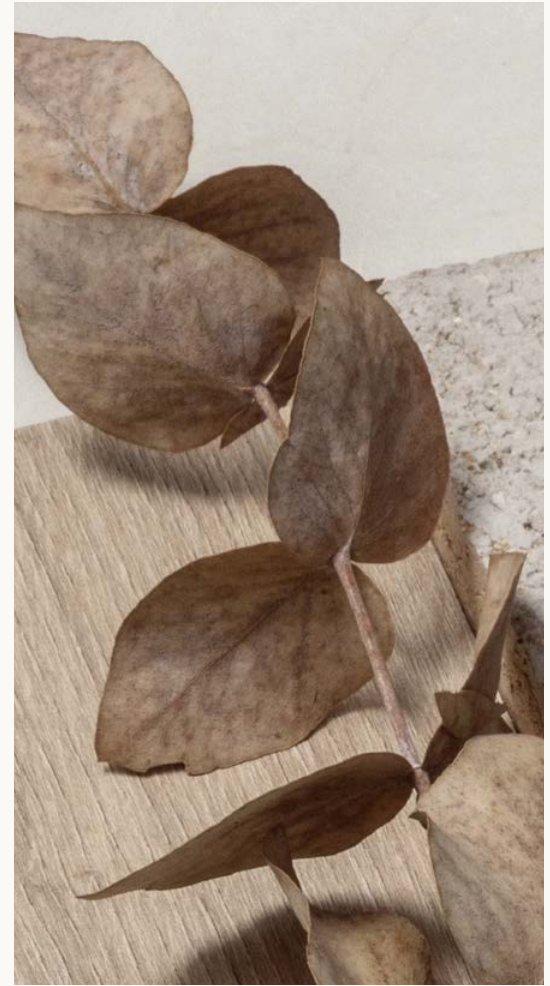
Vanity

Lighting

As an effective way to create a focal point in a room, you'll find these commonly featured in dining areas and voids. Sleek wall sconces are also becoming increasingly popular, predominantly for their role in highlighting the beauty of the 'in-between' spaces throughout a Contemporary home.

Textures and styling

Entry and windows

Feature entry doors create a stunning entrance to any new home. Mirror the materials and detailing found inside your home to create a cohesive feel from start to finish. Taller and wider windows and doors add grandeur, especially to a Contemporary home characterised by free-flowing, open-plan spaces.

Lighting

Enhance your home's architectural silhouette and all-round street presence with well-planned landscape lighting and perfectly positioned wall sconces.

Materials

Mixed materials enhance the look of the Contemporary facade. Often, combinations of bricks, render and styles of cladding help to create visual presence and depth to the exterior of your home. Your colour palette can feature either high or low contrast colours, but it's important to consider how the shades are impacted by varying degrees of sunlight throughout different parts of the day.

Benchtops

A beautiful, marbled stone benchtop brings old world style to your kitchen. With plenty of space to cook, prep and entertain, be prepared for your kitchen island to be the focal point.

Cabinetry

In Provincial-Chic inspired kitchens, you'll find settler-profile cabinetry often in hues of crisp, antique white.

Fixtures

Antique or vintage-inspired knobs or decorative handles do the trick, while polished chrome or brushed nickel tapware suits the traditional palette.

Lighting

Cladding and brick

As you know, Mid-Century design is all about bringing the outside in. Consider accenting your walls and spaces with timber panelling. Even organic breeze block style bricks are a great way to grant open plan spaces a degree of separation and privacy.

Flooring

Oak, teak or walnut toned timber flooring is a classic Mid-Century inspired choice. Large slate or travertine style tiles are a beautiful way to incorporate the connection with the outdoors.

Stairs

Use a slim profile of balustrades and hand rails for your stairs, and opt for a semi-cantilevered style staircase to maintain an open, airy and minimalist feel.

Brick

Smooth and uniform in colour, Mid-Century inspired bricks are often laid in linear patterns that highlight simplicity and form. Keep your eye on types of bricks that are thinner and longer, as these create a sleek and modern look.

Cladding

Vertical cladding, designed to emphasise simplicity and texture reinforces the pared back aesthetic of Mid-Century style.

Roof

Characterised by flat or skillion silhouettes with dramatic overhangs, Mid-Century rooflines emphasise clean lines that blend with the surrounding landscape.

Windows

Typically large, asymmetrical and with minimal framing, windows in Mid-Century design are strategically positioned to enhance natural light and blur the lines between indoor and outdoor spaces.

Benchtops

Cabinetry

Think of warm and natural materials for your cabinetry – like rich timber, which deliver an artisanal feel to your kitchen. Open shelving is also a great way to showcase your rustic vases, earthenware and recipe books.

Fixtures

Tiles

Rich in colour and texture, Moditerranean tiles embrace terracotta, stone and feature walls of handcrafted ceramics.

Vanity

Arched details, soft curves and natural materials like wood and stone evoke old Mediterranean character while still keeping your space fresh and contemporary. Leave ample bench space for hints of muted greenery, such as olive branches, as well as homely additions like candles, soaps and linen.

Flooring

Inspired by the warm climate of its namesake, terracotta or natural stone tiles are a common choice for flooring. For timber look floors, you'll want to opt for warm toned wood with a visible grain.

Stairs

Wooden railings, iron or metal balustrades and a curved profile to keep an organic sense of movement will successfully craft a Moditerranean-inspired staircase feature. Add in metal or coloured glass wall sconces for a beautiful finishing touch.

Textures and styling

Moditerranean is about blending the contemporary with the rustic — and this extends to your styling choices. Between handcrafted pottery pieces, olive green foliage, vases and candlesticks, natural woven rugs of sisal or jute and deep-cushioned linen furniture — you'll create a Moditerranean space full of character.

Window furnishings

Opt for a classic shutter in a natural hue or wood stain, or call upon natural linen or sheer furnishings to help diffuse sunlight.

Alfresco style dining is synonymous to the Mediterranean lifestyle. You can create this look in your home easily with boxed raised garden beds for your plants and veggies, creeping vines, olive and lemon trees and big clay pots of hardy herbs. Lounge furniture, open fireplaces and decorative wall treatments such as cladding and wall planters help you to create a unique and character-filled oasis.

Windows and entrance

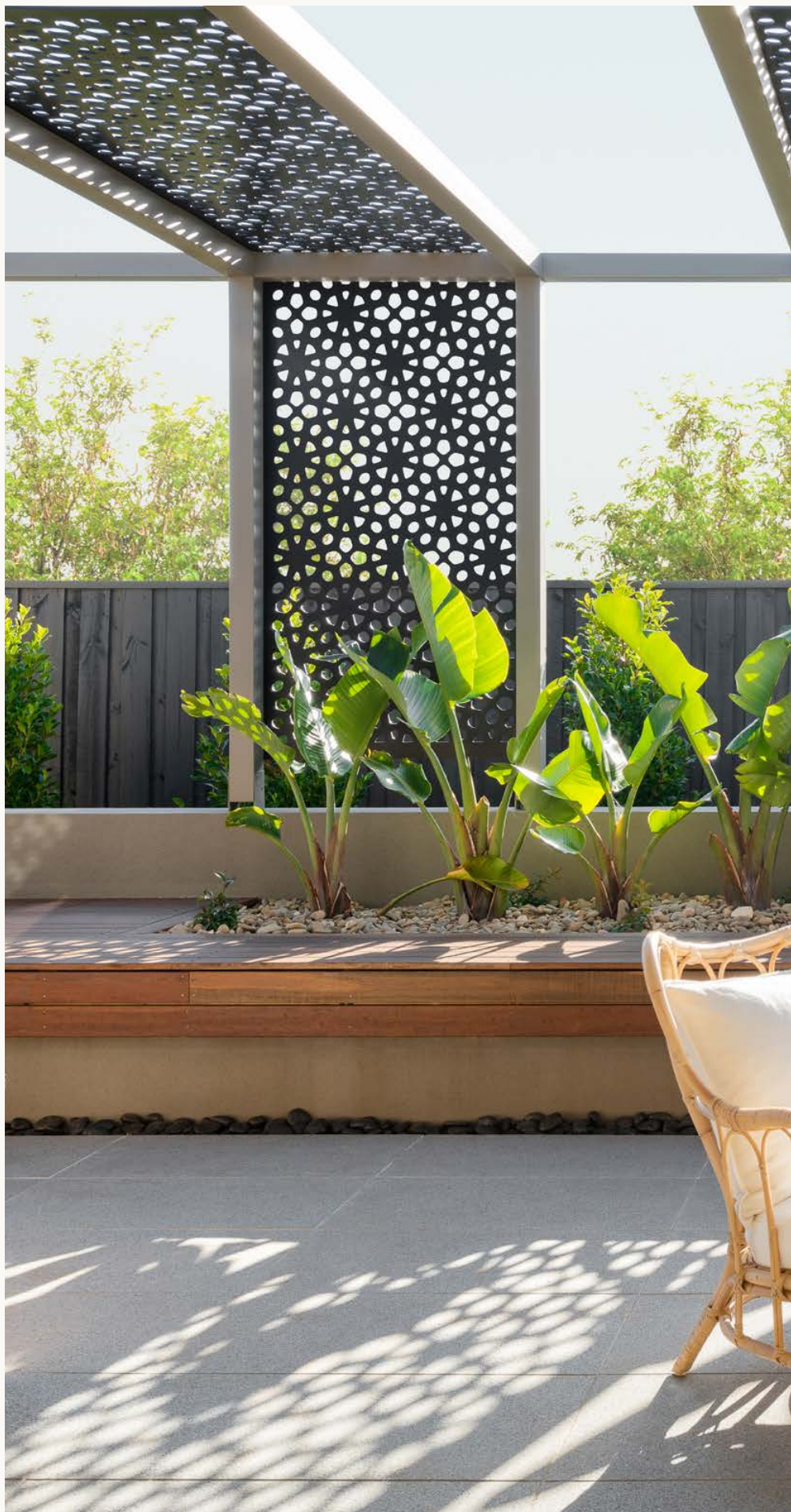
Moditerranean has signalled the resurgence of organic curves and arches paired with sturdy wrought iron details. This can be cleverly integrated to your front entry alongside ornate timber and decorative glass. The use of a curved glass feature door throughout the interior of the home is a modern take on the traditional archways found in a typical Mediterranean styled villa.

Colour palette

A palette of terracotta, ochre, creams or soft yellows deliver a Moditerranean theme. Keep finishes smooth, or add a stucco finish for enhanced rustic charm.

Roof

Finish with a terracotta roof or profiled concrete roof tile to complete this look. Warmer tones in rich browns, oranges and reds are traditionally used in a European style villa, however the introduction of charcoal tones has added a modern take to this classic European street style.

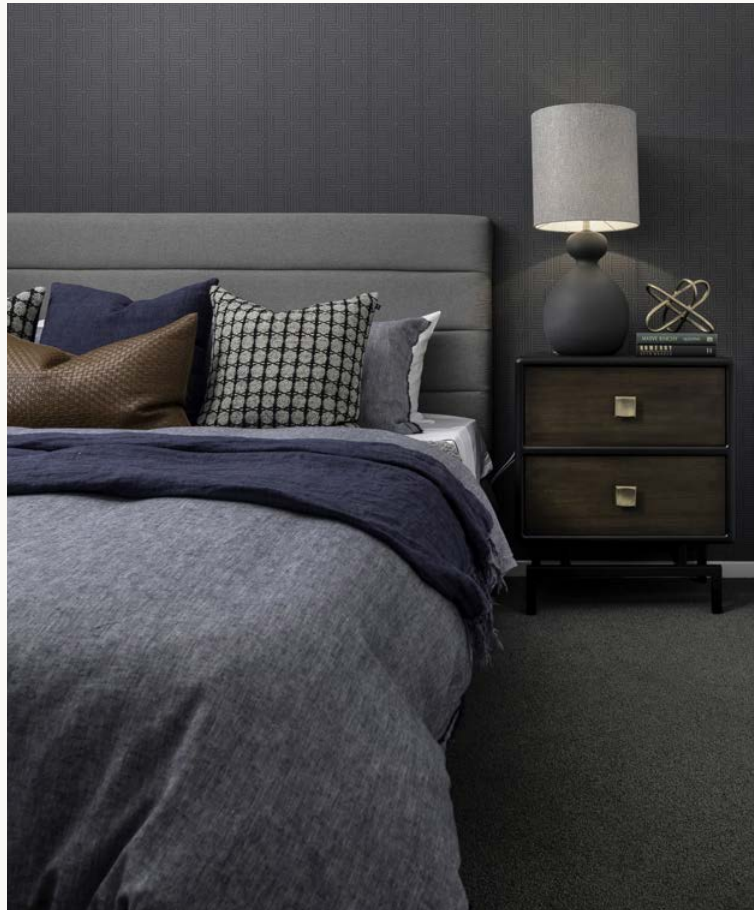
Roof

Benchtops

Thick, concrete look benchtops will be your go-to in an Urban kitchen due to their raw and imperfect feel. Avoid glossy and polished finishes all round and opt for industrial stainless steel appliances that are as functional as they are chic.

Cabinetry

Bring personality to your space with floating wood or metal shelving above your countertops, while down below, your cabinetry should be in a matte and dark neutral or deep wood. Edge pulls or linear handles replace decorative hardware.

Fixtures

Fixtures in matte black, brushed nickel and brushed carbon are becoming increasingly popular for this look, as they reinforce the bold and strong feel of Urban interiors. Maintain these finishes throughout the home for a cohesive look.

Lighting

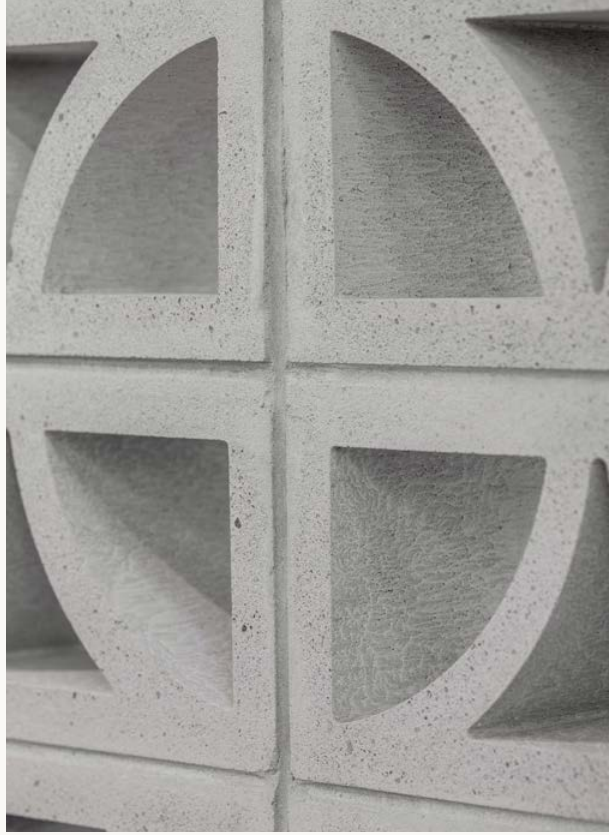
